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## A BRIEF PROFILE

Wangcha Rajkumar Government College (Formally Tirap Government College), the premier institute of higher learning in Tirap and Longding districts has completed its excellent journey of 27 years.

It had a humble beginning in 1997 at Charju, Khonsa, before being shifted to its present location. Historically, it has a record in pioneering higher education in Patkai region of Arunachal, and fulfills the long-cherished desire of the people of this area. The college has been renamed, from the earlier "Tirap Government College" to existing "Wangcha Rajkumar Government College" by the Government in memory of Lt. Wangcha Rajkumar, a renowned public leader of the area.

The campus is situated within the town of Deomali, a sub-division of Tirap District. The campus is quiet and traffic-free. Deomali town is itself easily accessible by public or private transport from nearby towns and states. Khonsa, the district headquarters of Tirap district, and Dibrugarh and Tinsukia, major towns of Upper Assam, are within a couple of hours journey from Deomali. The nearest railway station is Naharkatia (at a distance of 18 kilometres approximately) and the nearest airport is at Mohanbari, Dibrugarh (72 kilometres approximately).

The college has always maintained its principle of being an institution for imparting value-based education and for nurturing academic confidence and excellence. The track record of the college in the university examinations speaks for the quality of education imparted here. The college's excellent reputation in teaching, its strong examination results and its support facilities create an academic environment where students are inspired to reach their highest potential. The academic activities are bolstered with various extra-curricular activities which support the growth of all-round potential of the students.

The institution is committed to providing the leadership and direction for the times ahead in every sphere of human enterprise and endeavor, and aims to establish symbiotic cord between the teacher and the taught, and to instill the concept of *vasudhaiva kutumbkam* (the entire earth as one family).

## IMPORTANT NOTE

- Students must read the prospectus carefully before filling the Admission Form. The college administration shall not be held responsible for any mistake made by Student in the Admission Form and subsequent rejection by the Admission Committee.
- Catchment area norm will be strictly adhered to as per Govt. Order No. ED/HE-104/86, Dated 18<sup>th</sup> July, 1998 and the state Cabinet's decision, dated 3<sup>rd</sup> July' 2015. No request or recommendations will be entertained for admission of students from outside the catchment area. However, 5% seats shall be reserved for those students whose parents are working in Tirap District.
- **No student will be allowed to change his/her subject after admission.**
- The college being a Govt. College is governed by rules and regulations of Arunachal Pradesh Govt., and in its administrative matters and its academic matters are regulated by Rajiv Gandhi University, Itanagar (a Central University), to which it is affiliated.
- The original documents will be handed back to the students, excluding Transfer Certificate/School Leaving Certificate and Character Certificate, after proper verification by the competent authority.
- Students' Union Election will be held as per the norms of Lyngdoh Commission.
- For Old Semester System, the Six Semester Degree course must be completed within a maximum period of 6 (six) years from the year of Admission. After Registration of B. A. & B. COM I. Semester in the college, the maximum period for completing the B. A. & B. COM Degree is 6 (six) years which will be determined from the year of Registration. A student must pass all his/her semester examinations within six years i.e. within 12 continuous semesters. In no circumstances this requirement shall be relaxed.
- For CBCS students, the degree programme leading to the award of Bachelor of Arts and Bachelor of Commerce shall be of three years' duration and include six semesters. All programmes shall be completed in a maximum time period of five years (10 semesters) consecutively from the date of admission to the programme.
- The duration of the course under NEP is of Seven Years (7) maximum.
- Students must maintain proper and decent dress code.
- It is mandatory for all the students to produce clearance certificate from Library, Store Keeper, NSS, NCC, and Hostel Warden for issuance of Admit Cards, Caution Money and Certificates.
- Ragging is banned in all the educational institution in India as per Supreme Court order of 2007. If anyone found guilty, drastic action will be taken as per law.
- **PRINCIPAL RESERVES THE RIGHT OF ADMISSION.**

- a UG certificate after completing 1 year (2 semesters) of study in the chosen fields of study,
- a UG diploma after 2 years (4 semesters) of study,
- a bachelor's degree after a 3-year (6 semesters) programme of study,
- a 4-year bachelor's degree (honours) after eight semesters programme of study. If the student completes a rigorous research project in their major area(s) of study in the 4th year of a bachelor's degree (honours with research).

### **Eligibility**

Senior Secondary School Leaving Certificate or Higher Secondary (12th Grade) Certificate obtained after successful completion of Grade 12 or equivalent stage of education corresponding to National Credit Framework (NCrF) credit level 4.0.

### **Duration**

The duration of the UG programme is 4 years or 8 semesters with multiple entry and exit points and re-entry options, with appropriate certifications provided they secure the prescribed number of credits. Students may be permitted to take a break from the study during the period of study but the total duration for completing the programme shall not exceed 7 years.

### **UG Certificate, UG Diploma, and Degrees Under NEP**

#### **UG Certificate**

If a student wants to leave after the completion of the first year (2 within the stipulated maximum period of seven years, semesters) and have secured 40 credits, the student will be given a UG Certificate if, in addition, they complete one vocational course of 4 credits during the summer vacation of the first year (Guidelines for Multiple Entry and Multiple Exit for FYUP of Rajiv Gandhi University). Students who exit with a UG certificate are permitted to re-enter within three years and complete the degree programme within the stipulated maximum period of seven years..

#### **UG Diploma**

If a student desires to leave after the completion of the second year (4 semesters) and have secured 80 credits, the student will be given a UG Diploma if, in addition, they complete one vocational course of 4 credits during the summer vacation of the second year. (Guidelines for Multiple Entry and Multiple Exit for FYUP of Rajiv Gandhi University). Students who exit with a UG diploma are permitted to re-enter within

three years and complete the degree programme within the maximum period of seven years.

### **3-Year Bachelor's Degree (Major)**

Students who exit with a UG diploma are permitted to re-enter within three years and complete the degree programme within the maximum period of seven years.

### **4-Year Bachelor's Degree (Honours)**

If the student completes 4th year of a bachelor's degree (8 semesters) with securing 160 credits, the student will be awarded a 4-year Bachelor's Degree (Honours).

### **4-Year Bachelor's Degree (Honours with Research)**

If the student completes a rigorous research project in their major area(s) of study in the 4<sup>th</sup> year of a bachelor's degree (8 semesters), the student will be awarded a 4-year Bachelor's Degree (Honours with Research)

**Note:** Affiliating colleges offering a 4-year UG Degree (Honours with Research) must have the required infrastructure such as the library, access to journals, computer lab and software, laboratory facilities to carry out experimental research work, and at least two permanent faculty members who are recognized as Ph.D. supervisors. University Departments/Institutes already recognized for conducting the Ph.D. programme may conduct a 4-year UG Degree (Honours with Research).

### **Four-Year Undergraduate Programme (FYUP) AT RGU**

The four-year Undergraduate programme (FYUP) at Rajiv Gandhi University provides students with the chance to gain knowledge in a core (Major) subject area and to develop their skills in a multidisciplinary manner, which opens up opportunities for outstanding research.

#### **Curricular components of the FYUP:**

The curriculum of FYUP consists of major and minor courses, courses from other disciplines, language courses, skill courses, and a set of courses on Environmental education, understanding India, Digital and technological solutions, Health & Wellness, Yoga education, sports, and fitness and vocational courses.

#### **Major Courses:**

The courses under major category would provide the opportunity for a student to pursue in-depth study of a particular subject discipline. A student enrolled in FYUP has to choose a subject discipline as his/her major from the list of Major Courses approved by the Academic Council of Rajiv Gandhi University. A student has to secure a minimum of 90 credits in the FYUP as Major courses. These major courses are categorized as follow:



- (i) **Foundation or introductory courses:** These courses are intended the students to gain an understanding and have basic knowledge about the subjects. Students have to study such two such courses in the first year of the programme, one in 1st semester and another in 2nd semester. It will enable students to opt the subject of his/her interest after one year.
- (ii) **Intermediate-level courses:** These are subject-specific courses intended to meet the credit requirements for major areas of learning. These courses are part and pre- requisite courses for advanced-level major courses. A student has to be enrolled in a number of such courses in the 3rd, 4th, 5th and 6th Semesters of his/her study.
- (ii) **Higher-level courses:** These courses are required to get Honours in a particular subject discipline in the FYUP. A Student has to enrol into the Advanced-level courses including research methodology, project/dissertations after successful completion of 6th semester of the programme.

**Minor Courses:**

In this category, students have to choose a minimum of 4 credits per semester throughout the programme from 1st semester to 8th semester. A student has to choose 50% of the total credits under this category from a subject discipline relevant to the major discipline enrolled. A student has to enrol minor courses from the relevant discipline in the 1st , 2nd and 3rd semester.

**Vocational courses as Minor:** In FYUP of Rajiv Gandhi University, he/she has to carry out three courses of 4 credits each in a total of 12 credits relating to Vocational Education and Training in the 4th, 5th, and 6th semesters. A student has the freedom to choose these vocational courses from the list of vocational courses available in the Rajiv Gandhi University/college concerned.

**Multidisciplinary Courses (09 credits):**

To enhance the intellectual experience and form part of liberal and science education, students of Rajiv Gandhi University are required to undergo three introductory level courses which are new disciplines for the student. Under this category, Students are not allowed to choose or repeat courses already undergone at the higher secondary level (12th class) in the proposed major and minor. Students have to be enrolled in such MDC courses in the 1st, 2nd, and 3rd semesters from the list of Multidisciplinary Courses provided by the Department of Rajiv Gandhi University/college

**Ability Enhancement Courses (AEC) (08 credits):**

To achieve competency in Languages and communication skills for the improvement of their intellectual minds, Rajiv Gandhi University has introduced two courses one in the first semester and one in the second semester on English Language. The first course in the 1st semester ENG AE 1110: English Language and Communication Skills is a compulsory course for all students enrolled in FYUP. In the second semester, the students have to be enrolled in the course ENG AE 1210: Academic Writing and Professional Communication under this category. However, a student has the freedom to choose other Language courses approved by the Academic Council of Rajiv Gandhi University in the second semester under this category

**Skills Enhancement Courses (SEC) (09 credits):**

These courses are aimed at imparting practical skills, hands-on training, soft skills, etc., to enhance the employability of students. The institution may design courses as per the student's needs and available institutional resources. Students have to be enrolled in such Skill Enhancement Course of 3 credits each in the 1st, 2nd, and 3rd semester from the list of Skill Enhancement Courses.

**Value-Added Courses (VAC) (06 credits):**

In FYUP of Rajiv Gandhi University, to promote holistic development by nurturing the physical, mental, social, and emotional well-being of students, three Value Added courses in the 1st, 2nd, and 3rd semesters of the programme. In the first year of the UG program, the two courses mandatory related to Environmental Studies (Annexure V) are introduced under this category (VAC). These courses are EVS VA 0010: Environmental Science – I in the first semester and EVS VA 0020 Environmental Science –II in the second semester. These courses are mandatory for all students admitted to the UG program of Rajiv Gandhi University. In the third semester, the student has the freedom to choose value-added courses listed in **(Annexure III: List Value Added Courses in FYUP of Rajiv Gandhi University and its affiliated colleges) provided by the Rajiv Gandhi University/college concerned.**

**Summer Internship /Apprenticeship:**

In a four-year, Undergraduate program, Rajiv Gandhi University has introduced a mandatory internship of 2 credits to feel the induction of actual work situations. All students will also undergo internships / Apprenticeships in a firm, industry, or organization or Training in labs with faculty and researchers in their own or other HEIs/research institutions during the summer term. Students will be provided with opportunities for internships with local industry, business organizations, health, and allied areas, local governments (such as panchayats, and municipalities), Parliament or elected representatives, media organizations, artists, crafts persons, and a wide variety of organizations so that students may actively engage with the practical side of their learning and, as a by-product, further improve their employability. A student has to follow the rules and regulations for this mandatory internship course provided by Rajiv Gandhi University **(Guidelines for Internship /Apprenticeship in FYUP of Rajiv Gandhi University and its affiliated colleges is under process will be updated soon)**

**Internship /Apprenticeship to exit from the courses:**

Students who wish to exit after the first two semesters or after four semesters will have to undergo a 4-credit work-based learning/internship during the summer term to get a UG Certificate (after 2nd semester) or Diploma (after 4th semester). This Internship / Apprenticeship to exit from the course with a certificate or diploma has to be linked with the skill-based courses the student has completed in the first three semesters of his/her study. A student has to follow the rules and regulations for Internship /Apprenticeship to exit from the courses provided by Rajiv Gandhi University **(Guidelines for Internship /Apprenticeship in FYUP of Rajiv Gandhi University and its affiliated colleges is under process will be updated soon)**

**Research Project / Dissertation:**

Students choosing a 4-Year Bachelor's Undergraduate (Honors with Research) are required to take up research projects under the guidance of a faculty member. The students are expected to complete the Research Project in the eighth semester. The research outcomes of their project work may be published in peer-reviewed journals or may be presented in conferences /seminars or may be patented. From a selection of research project to award students has to follow the

**Other Activities:**

This component will include participation in activities related to National Service Scheme (NCC), National Cadet Corps (NCC), adult education/literacy initiatives, mentoring school students, and other similar activities.

**Course Structure:**

Rajiv Gandhi University is offering two kinds of FYDC one is called Four Year Undergraduate with Research and the other is Four Year Undergraduate without Research. A student admitted to FYDC follows the same course structure up to the 6th semester. After the compilation of the 6th semester of the student, the Department will review his/her performance and CGPA up to the 6th semester. Based on that review, a limited number of students will be enrolled in FYUP with Research and the others will be enrolled in FYUP without Research. The students enrolled in FYUP with Research and students enrolled in FYUP without Research will be enrolled in different courses in the 7th and 8th semester of their study as per the syllabus of the concerned discipline/subject. The Research Project of 12 Credit in the 8th semester is the major difference between FYUP with Research (Table 1.3) and FYUP without Research (Table 1.4).

The basic division of credits for FYUP including the exit option in each National Credit Framework Level is shown on Table 1.3 (with Research) and Table 1.4 (without Research). –

Where  $C_i$  is the number of credits of the  $i^{th}$  course and  $G_i$  is the grade point scored by the student in the  $i^{th}$  course.

The SGPA and CGPA shall be rounded off to two decimal points and reported in the transcripts.

- (iii.) Conversion of CGPA in to percentage (%): CGPA will be multiplied by 10. Percentage of marks = (CGPA X 9.5)

(iv.) The Letter grade 'B+' and above shall be considered as First Class and Letter grade 'B' shall be considered as Second Class.

(v.) A student is considered to have completed a course successfully and earned the prescribed credits if he/she secures a letter grade other than F (Failed) or 'Abs' (Absent/Incomplete).

(vi.) If a candidate secures 'F' grade in a Course, he/she shall have to reappear in the Course in the next legitimate chance.

(vii.) If a student secures 'F' grade in Project Work/ Dissertation/ Assignment etc., he/she shall have to re-submit it after necessary revisions. The Result shall be declared with next regular batch.

(viii.) 'Abs' grade shall be awarded to a candidate if he/she has not fulfilled the following requirements:

- a) If a candidate fails to appear in any Course(s) in an end semester examination.
- b) If a candidate fails to submit the project work/dissertation / assignment of an end semester examination.
- c) If a candidate is certified as not eligible to appear in any course(s) in an end semester examination by the Course Teacher(s) due to insufficient attendance in lectures, tutorials practical or fieldworks.

(ix.) The candidates not appearing in a Semester Examination shall be considered as an 'Abs' candidate and that will be reflected in the Grade Sheet of the candidate. These candidates shall have to convert the 'Abs' grade by appearing in the next examination on the Course (provided he/ she has legitimate chance to appear the Course) concerned or by submitting project work/dissertation/ assignment etc.

## UNIVERSITY RULES

1. All the students are required to attend a minimum of 75% of the lectures delivered during the academic session, to be eligible for the University examination.
2. **Failed students and those who did not appear for University Examination after getting Admit Card are not eligible for re-admission.**
3. Examination and Evaluation for Old Semester System:
  - i) Examination and evaluation shall be done on a continuous basis.
  - ii) There shall be 20% marks for internal assessment and 80% marks for end semester examination in each course during every semester.
  - iii) There shall be no provision for re-evaluation of the answer scripts of the end semester examinations. However, a candidate may apply for re-scrutiny.
4. Internal Assessment for Old Semester System:
  - i) For internal assessment, different tools may be employed such as written tests, assignments, papers presentation, laboratory work, etc., suitable to prescribed by the concerned Board. There shall be three internal assessments for each paper and average best of two shall be taken into account for University examination.
  - ii) The students will be informed in advance about the nature of assessment. Students shall compulsorily attend in the process of internal assessment, failing which they will not be allowed to appear in the end semester examinations.
5. End Semester Examinations for Old Semester System:
  - i) There shall be one End semester examination carrying 80 percent marks in each course, except for Geography, of a semester covering the entire syllabus prescribed for the course. The end semester examination is normally a written/laboratory-based examination/Project work/Dissertation as the case may be.
  - ii) The end semester examination for each course shall be of three or two-hours duration.
6. Results and Progression for Old Semester System:
  - i) A candidate shall be declared as passed a course provided he/she secures –
    - a) At least 35% marks in the course and 40 % in aggregate in the end-semester examinations.
    - b) At least 40% marks in the sessional/internal examination (In-Semester) and end semester examinations separately.

- ii) A candidate shall be declared as passed a semester, provided he/she passes all the courses of a semester **independently** both in internal and end semester examinations.
- iii) The marks of in-semester examinations sessional tests obtained by the candidate shall be carried over for declaring a result.
- iv) A candidate who fails or does not appear in one or more courses of any end semester examinations shall be provisionally promoted to the next higher semester with the failed course as carried over course (s). Such candidates will be eligible to appear in the carried over course in the next regular examinations of those courses. However, the following restrictions shall be applicable:
  - a) In order to move from a lower to higher semester, a candidate must pass in at least two theory courses and all the practical courses with an aggregate of 40% marks in the passed papers/courses.
  - b) A candidate shall be entitled to a maximum of three consecutive chances to clear a course.
  - c) A candidate shall be allowed to get maximum two back paper in each semester.
  - d) If a candidate clears the sixth semester examination before clearing the backlog courses of the previous semesters, his or her result will not be declared until he/she clears the backlog courses of the previous semesters.
- v) A student must pass all his/her semester examinations within six years i.e within 12 continuous semesters. In no circumstances this requirement shall be relaxed.
- vi) Since the semester system involves continuous assessment, there shall be no scope for a student to appear as a private candidate in any programme in the system.
- vii) A candidate shall be declared to have passed the six semester Degree B. A, B. SC/ B. Com programme provided he/she has passed all the semesters and in all the courses separately securing an aggregate of atleast 40% marks.
- viii) The degrees shall be conferred to candidates, who passed the six semester degree B. A/B. SC./B. Com programmes in the following manner.

<b>Programmes</b>	
60% and above marks in aggregate	First Class
40% to less than 60% marks in aggregate	Second Class

7. Improvement Examination for Old Semester System:

- i) A student shall be allowed to take the improvement examinations in any four theory courses of any of the six semesters after passing the sixth semester examination only once. In this case, the higher marks secured by the student shall be retained. The

candidates shall have to apply for improvement examination within **one year of passing the Sixth Semester Examination.**

- ii) No improvement shall be allowed in the practical examinations.

8. Examination, Evaluation, and Progression for CBCS System:

- i) A student shall be eligible to write the end semester examination if he/she has attended 75% of lectures delivered in the class during the semester in each subject.
- ii) All students will be subjected to the process of continuous evaluation and assessment. Accordingly, a student shall have to attend and duly pass in at least two Internal Assessment tests out of three tests, and End Semester Examination. The structure of these Internal Assessment Tests and End Semester Examinations shall be 20:80.
- iii) The minimum pass marks at the End Semester Examination shall be 35% in each paper and 40% in aggregate. The minimum pass marks at the internal assessment tests shall be 35% in each paper. The minimum pass marks for a practical paper shall be the same as that of the theory paper and inability to secure the minimum prescribed pass mark in a practical paper/component shall make the candidate fail in that paper.
- iv) A candidate who is unable to clear internal assessment and/or unable to clear minimum 50% courses/papers and all the practical courses with aggregate requirement of marks in qualifying courses/papers including practical courses in the First semester shall be out of the programme and required to seek fresh admission as per admission criteria of the University in force from time to time.
- v) A student shall not be promoted to the next semester unless he/she clears at least 50% of the total papers in an end-semester examination. In such cases, he/she shall be allowed to appear the back-paper examination in the failed papers in the subsequent relevant semester examinations.
- vi) In the case of Undergraduate programme, the maximum number of allotted semesters to complete and clear the course for award of the degree shall be 10 (ten) in continuum.
- vii) A student seeking to improve his/her result shall do so by applying for the same on payment of the prescribed fee in the next relevant semester examination and this improvement chance shall be availed only once in a course paper to the condition that the result of such an improvement examination shall not count towards award of rank/medal or any other prize available at the disposition of the university.

9. Rules for Admission on Transfer from other University.

- i) Ordinarily, the University shall not allow admission on transfer from other Universities.
- ii) Transfer from other Universities to Rajiv Gandhi University shall be permissible provided that



- a) Both the Universities conduct the B.A/B.Sc/B.Com degree programmes in the semester system.
  - b) The course structures along with the nomenclatures of the courses are similar between the two Universities.
  - c) The combination of courses opted by the candidate are not changed.
- iii) In fulfillment of the conditions as laid down in clause ii), a candidate may be allowed to get admission on transfer from other universities on production of transfer certificate, proof of classes attended, migration certificate etc. not later than one month from the commencement of classes of the semester concerned. The records of class attendance, performance in internal assessment in his/her credit shall be carried over on admission and shall be computed for the purpose of examination.
  - iv) A candidate shall have to apply for transfer in the prescribed format of the university and payment of the **prescribed fee** as decided by the University.

10. Rules for admission on Transfer from other Colleges affiliated to Rajiv Gandhi University.

- i) Ordinarily, the university shall not allow inter-college transfer.
- ii) In a special circumstance, a candidate may be allowed to get admission on transfer from one college/institute to other college/institute affiliated to/permitted by Rajiv Gandhi University on production of transfer certificate, proof of classes attended, migration certificate etc. not later than one month from the commencement of the classes of the semester concerned or the last date mentioned in the university academic calendar. The records of class attendance, performance in internal assessment in his/her credit shall be carried over on admission and shall be computed for the purpose of examination.
- iii) No change in course combination shall be allowed with transfer from one college/institute to other.
- iv) A candidate shall have to apply for transfer in the prescribed format of the university along with **prescribed fee**.
- v) A candidate may be allowed for college transfer only once during the whole programme.

## **FACILITIES FOR STUDENTS**

The college provides numerous facilities for the students. These facilities support the students in their quest for academic growth and personality development. These include stipends, career guidance, hostel accommodation, educational excursion, travel concession, various academic and extra-curricular activities, etc. Various cells and committees have been instituted to help the students gain access to these various facilities.

### **ACADEMIC BANK OF CREDIT (ABC)**

An Academic Bank of Credit (ABC) has been established in the College which would digitally store the academic credits earned from various recognized HEIs so that the degrees from an HEI can be awarded.

### **HOSTEL ACCOMODATION**

The college provides separate hostel facilities, including mess, for both boys and girls during the academic session. Hostel Rules must strictly be adhered to while boarding. The Superintendents of the respective hostels can be contacted for admission and other details.

#### **HOSTEL RULES:**

1. Limited seats are available for both boys and girls. The seat shall be allotted after the admission to the college purely on merit basis. Student residing within 8 (eight) kilometers of the college campus shall not be provided Hostel seats.
2. Students once admitted to the hostel will have to follow hostel rules and regulation framed by the authority from time to time. Before leaving the hostel, a boarder shall have to seek prior permission from the hostel Superintendent by submitting an application to the effect.
3. Hostel seats shall be allowed only to the Scheduled tribes students of Arunachal Pradesh.
4. General appearance and behavior of the boarders must be decent. Smoking, Drinking and taking of Drugs are Strictly Prohibited in the hostel premises. The feeling of brotherhood and communal harmony is to be maintained and fostered in words and deeds.
5. Joining the Hostel Mess is Compulsory.

## **STUDENTS' UNION**

The College constitutes a general body of the students known as Wangcha Rajkumar College Students' Union that is fully committed to the cause of the students. A student becomes the member of the Union's General Body after regular admission in the college and gets the right to vote, and to participate in all the activities of the Union. The Union elects its executive members through secret ballot strictly as per the norms recommended by Lyngdoh Committee. Executive members elected every year are: General Secretary, Assistant General Secretary, Cultural, Literary, Games and Sports, Social Service Secretaries, among others.

## **THE COLLEGE LIBRARY**

Wangcha Rajkumar Government College library provides an environment where students and faculty can meet their learning and teaching needs and develop lifelong habits of self-improvement, free inquiry and free expression. In order to achieve this, the college library provides services that allow users to obtain and evaluate information from many different sources in different formats, providing seamless support for planning, researching and completing academic work. Improved performance will translate into improved student success, one of the college's major values. Other significant college values include teaching, learning, inclusiveness and collaboration. To support these values, the college's library will be:

1. An intellectual center ensuring access to quality, cost-effective resources and tools in a variety of easily accessible formats
2. A collaborative space for students, faculty and librarian, encouraging learning communities and group work across diverse disciplines
3. A student-centered space for advancing social interactions and dialogue
4. A resourceful place where students can come to enhance their knowledge and skills

## **RULES FOR COLLEGE LIBRARY:**

1. Library membership is open for bonafide students, teachers and staff. However, others may be allowed to use the library with prior permission of the Principal. The book will be issued from the counter where the member produces his/her ticket and his/her identity card.
2. Loss of borrower's ticket should be immediately reported to the librarian and duplicate ticket at the cost of Rs. 100/- shall be issued. But the responsibility of books borrowed on the original

tickets will remain with the bonafide owner of the tickets for the full period of validity of the tickets. Borrower's ticket shall be valid for the period mentioned on the tickets or up to end of the academic session whichever is earlier. Borrower will be held responsible for the misuse of their borrower's ticket and for the books issued for them, Disciplinary action will be taken for any misuse of borrower's tickets.

3. All the students shall receive two borrower tickets, to borrow books from the general section of the library. The tickets are not transferable. Reference books, out of print books and current periodicals will not be loaned. Library staff will provide referencing services, catalogues and referencing index. The general section books will be issued for "14 days." Books stamped "Not for issue" and "reference" will not be issued. During the examinations, books issued for a week shall not be renewed even if there is no demand. For renewal, the books are to be presented at the counter. Renewal is not automatic. If there is a pending demand for the book, the request for the renewal may not be accepted by the librarian. A book issued successively for two times will not be re-issued.
4. Text books will be issued for two weeks. After that an overdue fine @ Rs. 5 per day per volume will be charged; after one week, charge will be Rs. 10/- per day.
5. If any book is lost by a borrower, he will either replace with the latest edition of that book or pay the price assessed by the library. If the book is spoiled, he will replace the book / pay the assessed cost of the book. Borrowers should inspect the books carefully before getting them issued. Defect if any, should be brought to the notice of the librarian at the counter at the time of issuing. If a defect by way of damage etc. is discovered later the borrower will be responsible and shall be liable to make payment. No person is allowed to write down or damage or make any mark on any book or reading material or tamper with any book or material belonging to library.
6. While you are entering the library please carry your I.D. card. Do not lend your I.D. card to others; do not use others' I.D. card. When you are entering the library please leave your bags, books, notebooks, etc. in the place allotted.
7. Except white paper (for taking down notes) no other material is allowed.
8. No dues certificate will be issued to a member on returning all the borrower's tickets and library books.
9. Membership of a user can be suspended on account of misbehaviour with the Library staff.

### LIBRARY ETHICS:

1. Users shall maintain silence in the library.
2. Reading materials should not be re-shelved by the user to avoid misplacement.
3. Use of mobile phone, smoking, chewing tobacco, eating, photography etc. are strictly prohibited in the library.
4. If you are not able to keep the books in proper place, just leave it on the table, do not insert in wrong place. Please avoid hiding books in different places.
5. Library is a service organization, not only for today but for generations. So kindly avoid tampering with books or any other document.

### STIPEND & BOOK GRANT

A financial aid in the form of stipend and book grant is given to all the bonafide students belonging to the Scheduled Tribes of Arunachal Pradesh. The online application has to be filled up by the bonafide student of Wangcha Rajkumar Government College, Deomali under the following schemes.

The students of B.A III and V Semester have to apply in **Renewal** section with the same **Login ID** and **Password** as set by the students. However, B. A. I Semester students needs to apply in **Fresh** section, register yourself, and note down the **Login ID** and **Password** for future reference. After successful registration, do not forget to submit a print copy of the application along with a Xerox copy of Schedule Tribe certificate, SBI Bank Account details and Aadhaar card for further necessary action at institutional level.

Please note that **the college shall not be responsible in case of any error at any stage.**

**STIPEND RULES:**

- a) A student can avail only one stipend from above given schemes in a semester.
- b) The stipend totally depends on the good and satisfactory progress and conduct of the stipendiary. If he/she is found guilty of misconduct, such as resorting to participation in the strike, violence, irregular in class attendance, remaining absent without the permission of the authority, or to have committed any major offence or breach of college and hostel peace and discipline, the principal can suspend the award of stipend with the approval of the Governing Body of the College.
- c) The Government shall have the inherent right to cancel the stipend wholly or partly or stop or withheld further payment of such period for reasons enumerated in para (b) above or for any other reasons, which the Government thinks proper as per rule.
- d) **Student passing the last examination with compartment will not be paid any stipend in the next session. However, student shall be entitled to stipend after clearly passing out the University Examination.**
- e) If a student is found to have obtained stipend by false statement, the stipend paid will be recovered at the discretion of the Govt. of Arunachal Pradesh and the student concerned will be black listed and debarred from stipend or any scheme forever.
- f) Working students shall not be paid stipend.
- g) Stipend awarded may be cancelled if the student changes the institution of study without the prior approval of Government of Arunachal Pradesh.

## **CERTIFICATE FOR ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE**

The Hon'ble Governor of Arunachal Pradesh awards three students who have completed their degree in the previous academic year and secured the highest grade/percentage of marks from among all the other students of all the subjects/streams of their batch. A certificate is provided whereby their achievement and rank is mentioned.

## **BUS SERVICE**

The college offers bus service for the students to commute from the town and nearby areas to the college on all working days and at scheduled time.

## **COMPUTER LAB**

With a view to impart computer learning to the students and staff, the Government of Arunachal Pradesh has established a well-equipped Computer Center in the college. The Centre offers short term courses in Basic computer knowledge and Information technology.
